Saint Benedict - July 11 Fr. Thomas Koys

A Declaration of Dependence - Ven Archbishop Fulton J. Sheen Some thoughts to ponder for this 4th of July weekend

"Whence comes the right to life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness? Read the Declaration of Independence and there find the answer:

> 'We hold these truths to be self-evident, that all men are created equal, that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable Rights, that among these are Life, Liberty, and the pursuit of Happiness."

If these rights were bestowed on us by the government, then the government could take them away, but these rights are unalienable because they are gifts from God. In other words, we are dependent on God, and that initial dependence is the foundation of our independence.

Saint Benedict was born in the year 480 in Norcia, a small town in the Umbria region of central Italy. From early in his life, he sought God in solitude, even living in a cave for three years.

In his thirties, he founded a total of thirty-nine monasteries. At the most famous of these, Montecassino, he wrote the rule for his monks. The Rule of St Benedict has become the norm for all Western monasticism.

Today there are two branches of Benedictines: the Benedictine Federation, comprised of men and women of the Order of St. Benedict and the Cistercians, men and women of the Order of Cistercians of the Strict Observance. Saint Benedict Center: Franciscan Media
